**Hospice uses slows** 

In Oregon, growth in hospice use

was slower than elsewhere in

the US<sup>2</sup>



#### **Hospice closures**

- In <u>Canada</u>, hospices refusing to offer assisted deaths have had their funding stopped <sup>1</sup> Assisted deaths are much cheaper than hospice care
- (1 Canadian AD = 1 week UK hospice care)

### **Funding remains poor**

In Canada, less than half those who died received palliative care,<sup>6</sup> and less than half of assisted deaths have seen a specialist PC team.<sup>9</sup> In the UK, many services are funded by charity.

# Hospices say no

- <u>Oregon</u> (in 2012): 66% of hospices did not allow staff to take part in assisted deaths.<sup>3</sup>
- <u>New Zealand</u>: nearly all hospices have refused to participate
- Jersey: hospice will not participate.<sup>4</sup>

# Palliative care services stall

- In Belgium and the Netherlands 2012-19 growth <u>stalled</u> in home care, hospital and inpatient palliative care services <sup>5</sup>
- Growth in European non-AD countries increased faster than AD countries <sup>5</sup>
- Swiss services are half what is needed and not growing <sup>10</sup>

# Changed doctorpatient relationships In <u>Canada</u> some doctors found the relationship with patients was more

difficult after legalisation <sup>7</sup>

In <u>Australia</u> doctors are unable to fulfil their legal requirements <sup>8</sup>
